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How Depression Is Linked to Oral Health




Individuals with depression visit the dentist for care significantly less often than those without depression. A new report highlights 8 findings from the scientific literature about the growing link between mental and oral health.

Veteran Dental Care Stimulates the Economy and Improves Overall Health


Insights from the American Institute of Dental Public Health and CareQuest Institute for Oral Health

Across the board, veterans are more likely to experience worse oral health outcomes — higher rates of tooth decay, higher rates of gum disease, and an increased need for restorative dental care — compared to nonveterans. Only 15% of veterans are eligible for dental care through the Veterans Health Administration (VHA), with roughly 33% of those utilizing this benefit. CareQuest Institute for Oral Health[®] and the American Institute of Dental Public Health (AIDPH) recently released a white paper, <u>Veteran Oral Health: Expanding Access and Equity</u>, focused on solutions supporting veteran oral health, physical health, and economic security.

How Do Veterans Currently Access Dental Care?

Our data underscore two clear conclusions: many veterans do not understand the dental benefits available to them through the VHA; and veterans are not accessing dental care effectively.

Nearly half of veterans we surveyed did not know about, or understand, the dental benefits available to them through the VHA. AlDPH and CareQuest Institute surveyed over 2,000 veterans nationally in 2021 on their oral health. More than 80% of




veterans said they "valued keeping their mouth healthy," but nearly half couldn't see a dentist in the past year largely due to cost and inability to find care, despite having oral pain or discomfort.



Dental Fear Affects People Across All Groups but Not Equally

Hispanic people were more than **2x more likely** to report dental fear than white people.

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



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

State of Oral Health Equity in America (SOHEA) Survey

The SOHEA survey is a nationally representative, probability-based survey of adult consumer attitudes, experiences, and behaviors on oral health.

- Data collected by the National Opinion Research Center (NORC) in two rounds, collected from January to February of both 2021 and 2022
- Survey was conducted online and by telephone through NORC's AmeriSpeak® Panel
- Sampling strata based on age, race/Hispanic ethnicity, education and gender – Additional sample of American Indian/Native Alaskan panelists in 2022
- Limited to adults age 18+; one response per household
- Final Sample size after exclusions:
 - 2021 N=5,320
 - 2022 N=5,682

Value of the State of Oral Health Equity in America Survey

- To our knowledge, there is not a survey of this size and high quality completely devoted to oral health.
- It provides timely and actionable insights into the state of adult attitudes, knowledges, and beliefs.
- It allows for a deeper understanding of oral health in historically underserved communities.
- Stakeholders use it to inform advocacy, policy, technology advancement, and clinical endeavors to transform the oral health care system into one that is more accessible, equitable, and integrated.
- CareQuest Institute uses the findings to inform programmatic initiatives and grantmaking efforts.












In general, how would you rate your oral health (state of your teeth, mouth, and gums)?

Disparities in Oral Health Status by Race/Ethnicity, 2022




Lower proportions of White Americans rated their oral health as fair or poor.



Importance of Oral Health (vs. Physical Health) by Race/Ethnicity






Highest proportion of Black, non-Hispanic adults reported oral health as more important than physical health.








Report Experiencing Any Kind of Discrimination on a Weekly Basis by Race/Ethnicity





The lowest proportion of white adults reported experiencing discrimination of any kind on a weekly basis.


Experiences of Discrimination in an Oral Health Care Setting in the Past Year by Race/Ethnicity


Disparities in Oral and Overall Health Status by Insurance Status



Higher proportions of those without dental insurance rated their oral health as poor compared to those with dental insurance. Higher proportions of those without dental insurance reported that their overall health has gotten worse over the past year compared to those with dental insurance.



Lack of Dental Insurance Is Often a Long-term Problem, with Uninsured Lacking Dental Home

Nearly 2/3 of those without dental insurance haven't had insurance for more than 5 years.

Lower proportions of those without dental insurance reported that they have a dental office that they usually go to for care compared to those with dental insurance.




Cost of Dental Care Prohibitive for the Uninsured

Adults Believe Dental Care Should Be Part of Public Insurance





Proportion Reporting Visiting ER for Dental Care/Pain in Mouth in the Past Year by Veteran Status



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
Transportation and Disability Barriers for Veteran Population

Report Experiencing Any Kind of Discrimination on a Weekly Basis by Veteran Status






Oral health and overall health are inextricably linked. There is mounting evidence to suggest that poor oral health is related to a <u>variety of chronic health conditions</u>, such as high blood pressure, dementia, diabetes, and obesity. Despite this known connection, dental care is still largely siloed from medical care. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that integrating basic health screenings into a dental setting could save the health care system up to \$100 million every year.¹

CareQuest Institute for Oral Health conducted a nationally representative survey in January and February 2021 to assess consumers' perspectives on oral and overall health (n=5320). CareQuest Institute also conducted a nationwide survey of oral health providers to assess perspectives and current behaviors related to interprofessional practice (n=377). Consumers and oral health providers described a lack of integration between medical and oral health care, and a desire for increased interprofessional collaboration.

Key Findings: Medical-dental collaboration is currently uncommon.


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
